Gupta, 68, who spent most of his career verclyde Royal in Greenock, rose from ty in the back streets of Delhi to become an nationally-renowned surgeon.

won the award in recognition of his tary work among the world's poorest people. ring the past 20 years he has used his spare to establish eye camps in India, Pakistan, ladesh, Nepal, Myanmar and Ethiopia. these camps, often in the most inhospitable ces, he and a small team have performed act surgery on some of the world's most yed people.

s conservatively estimated that, thanks to forts, nearly 3,000 people have had their restored.

Gupta's most recent eye camp was in India ear. It was the 15th since he started his ons in 1985.
